REMINDER: New Rates Take Effect December 15

All members should plan for the recently approved rate increase to take effect on December 15th. For most residential consumers, the change includes a \$5 increase to the monthly access charge, bringing it to \$33.00 per month, and a 3¢ increase to the on-peak energy rate, bringing that rate to 25¢ per kilowatt-hour (kWh) between 4 PM and 9 PM. The off -peak rate of 11¢ per kWh remains unchanged. The new rates will be reflected in the January bill.



Working Together to Lower Demand


Cold winter weather increases electricity use as heating systems work harder and households use more lighting and appliances. Because many people use power at the same times—especially in the mornings and between 4 PM and 9 PM—these "peak hours" put added strain on the electric grid. SMPA partners with Tri-State Generation and Transmission to anticipate these seasonal patterns and ensure reliable power, but our local system is also part of a larger regional grid that benefits from efficient use by everyone.

Residents can help ease demand through simple actions on the coldest days: lower the thermostat a few degrees, delay running major appliances until off-peak times, set water heaters to 120°F and space out hot-water use, and unplug unneeded electronics and lighting. These small habits reduce stress on the grid, support system reliability, and help lower monthly energy bills. Working together, the community can keep homes comfortable and power dependable throughout the winter.
