Each year, the melting of the final snowfall signals the beginning of a busy season.

We kicked off the summer with our Annual Meeting of members on June 8 in Ridgway. This year's meeting featured food, music, activities, gifts and prizes. The meeting featured a keynote address from business consultant and behavioral analyst, Sue Hansen. Toward the end of the meeting, the board election results were announced:

In District No. 5, challenger, Joseph Shults received 85 votes while incumbent, Rube Felicelli received 156. In District No. 7, challenger, Dawn Glanc received 111 votes, while incumbent, Terry Rhoades received 269.

SMPA also played an important role in the "New Normal" initiative that runs through several of the Telluride summer festivals including the Balloon Festival, Mountainfilm, and the Bluegrass Festival.
